Colin Black Dreaming Backwards Through Morning



By juxtaposing recordings of dawn from my childhood farm in Australia with the sounds of my local street in Ljubljana (where I currently live), this new work is intended as a pluralistic form of geospatial autoethnography and geography. This new work explores how, through my increased mobility, one place (with its history, stories, culture and even elements of its soundscape) can be virtually superimposed onto another place and how that can deconstruct notions of a fixed place and time. With the further augmentation of musical composition, this works aims to encompass issues relating to memory, place, migration, dislocation and even ownership. Moreover, the work is intended to raise questions, that includes how this type of reconceptualisation of place can also impact on notions of identity, both personal and national.

SCDAWNREM20 is a live improvisation using SuperCollider, live environment atmosphere sound and CC-licenced field recordings. It will be performed from the most eastern part of the municipality of Ljubljana, where we remain in lockdown due to the pandemic. The location is elevated enough to afford a good view of the sunrise. The sound broadcast will happen roughly during civil twilight, starting at 45 minutes before sunrise.

Robertina Šebjanič: Talks with Grey Heron

The planes, the trains, the ships have stopped. For the time being, COVID-19 has suspended this unbearable noise of ours. The grey heron is searching for food on a river bank. We often sit together there and observe the water. I with my hydrophone immersed under the surface of the water and the heron keeping a sharp eye on the fish that have spread in these waters, having become accustomed to the noise of the boats. When the fog concealing the future will have lifted, I hope we will be able to keep an open and attentive ear to what the animals we coexist with have to say. The heron and I – we think about the pangolin finally able to walk in its natural environment without having to worry

about ending up on someone's plate.

Bats vs Corona, discusion

Slovenian Association for Bat Research and Conservation and international partners Moderated by Katarina Radaljac



Since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, scientists have been trying to answer questions about the origin of the virus. While there is no definite evidence to support any answers, different speculations and interpretations based on thus far available data have appeared in the public. One of the most common is the speculation that the virus was passed to humans from bats. Bats are therefore becoming increasingly vilified and presented in the media as a sort of public enemy. This speculation is often also well-received by the people (who are forced to stay at home, full of doubts and worries), because it is tangible and, at a first glance, very simple. As soon as we find the thing to blame, we can simply eliminate it and our problems will be gone. This kind of reasoning is quite often based on insufficient information or on information that is presented incorrectly or ambiguously. And since false information can hurt the perception of bats – as they are already getting intentionally hunted and killed – we have invited a group of experts to speak about bats and address the question of the alleged transmission of COVID-19 from bats to humans. We will talk about the major role bats play in maintaining a balanced ecosystem, about why it is important to protect the species, but we will also address the prejudice, fears and myths associated with these nocturnal animals as well as talk about simplified populist ideas and how science and expertise are ignored in the current global situation, all of which can lead to impulsive, rash decisions and strategies. We will try to find ways to inform the people and the media as objectively as possible about the research on the possible connections between bats and COVID-19 carried out thus far and, to wrap the discussion, also take audience questions.
